 to approve the May 23, 2024 meeting minutes as presented. Motion passed.

The Executive Committee convened into Executive Session at 10:38 a.m.

The Executive Committee returned to open session at 11:05 a.m. on August 22, 2024.

C. New Business

1. Health and Human Services Advisory Council Appointments

Mr. John Vorderkunz stated the Health and Human Services Advisory Council recommends that the HOTCOG Executive Committee appoint the following individual as voting member to the HHSAC for a 3-year term effective September 1, 2024 through August 31, 20027.

-Orma Williams – Limestone County – 3 year term

A motion was made by Judge Richard Duncan and seconded by Judge Jay Elliott to approve Ms. Orma Williams representing Limestone County as a member of the Health and Human Services Advisory Council to serve a 3 year term, September 1, 2024 through August 31, 2027. Motion passed.

2. Memorandum of Understanding between HOTCOG and HOTEDD Mr. Russell Devorsky presented a memorandum of understanding regarding staff support services between the Heart of Texas Council of Governments (HOTCOG) and the Heart of Texas Economic Development District (HOTEDD).

A motion was made by Judge Justin Lewis and seconded by Judge Jay Elliott to approve the Memorandum of Understanding as amended, between HOTCOG and HOTEDD. Motion passed.

3. Approval of HOTCOG 2024-2025 Budget

Mr. John Minnix presented the HOTCOG 2024-2025 Budget to the Executive Committee and reviewed highlights of the Budget. Mr. Minnix noted that HOTCOG has not received all of the "official" funding level notices from the state and federal agencies and the estimated revenues are based on a combination of official funding notices and estimated planning figures. Mr. Minnix stated the proposed budget contains a 2% cost of living increase (COLA) for all employees. Mr. Minnix noted under Grant Management Definitions, HOTCOG is required annually to certify that its Indirect Costs for the fiscal year do not exceed 15% of total expenditures as defined in Section 391.0115(e) of the State of Texas Local Government Code. For fiscal year 2024-2025, Indirect Costs as a percentage of total expenditures is projected at 9.57% as shown in the budget.

A motion was made by Judge Justin Lewis and seconded by Judge Jay Elliott to approve the FY2024-2025 HOTCOG Budget as presented and recommend that the budget be approved and adopted at the Semi-Annual Business Meeting, August 22, 2024. Motion passed.

 Mr. Minnix presented the Financial, Personnel and Investment reports to the committee.

 - -Staff member, Eric Hobbs, discussed the Public Health COVID-19 Emergency Preparedness Campaign and demonstrated what is enclosed in the tote which is distributed throughout the rural areas of the region. Five thousand totes were assembled and staff are in the process of distributing them.
 - -Staff member, John Vorderkunz, noted that through a special project, 3,582 medical trips through rural transportation, were purchased for HOTCOG AAA age 60 and older from October 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024.
 - -Mr. Pledger gave a report on activities of the Heart of Texas Rural Transit District.

3. Regional Services

a. Department Activities Report

Mrs. Jackson presented the Economic and Community Development Division report in a new format and highlighted the activities. Mrs. Jackson noted that regarding funding under the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) CDBG grants with current funding of \$12,253, three projects in the region were notified of funding. Five more projects in the region may also be funded due to monies being turned back in to TDA. A kick-off meeting will be scheduled in the future for those entities funded.

SUBJECT: FY25 Subrecipient and Contractor Funding

INFORMATION:

HOTCOG receives funding from the Texas Health and Human Services Commission for the Area Agency on Aging to provide services for Nutrition Services, Caregiver Respite, Health Maintenance (assistive medical devices), Homemaker, Personal Assistance, and Residential Repair with funding provided under Title III of the Older Americans Act and the Nutrition Services Incentive Program (NSIP) for Bosque, Falls, Freestone, Hill, Limestone, and McLennan Counties.

HOTCOG's Area Agency on Aging issued a Request for Best Value Bids to provide Congregate and Home Delivered Services for FY23-FY25 (October 1, 2023, through September 30, 2025,) with contracts including five one-year contract extensions. During the contract term, each subsequent years rates will be reviewed.

HOTCOG and the Nutrition Subrecipients will be executing contract amendments for FY25, October 1, 2024, through September 30, 2025, for the rates listed in the table below. Total estimates for FY25 level funding for Nutrition Services is \$984,772.00.

HOTCOG's Area Agency on Aging has requested Contractors to submit applications for the following services: Caregiver Respite, Health Maintenance, Homemaker, Personal Assistance, and Residential Repair serving the following counties: Bosque, Falls, Freestone, Hill, Limestone, and McLennan. The applications were due September 23, 2024. The contractors and unit rates for services will be provided at HOTCOG's Executive Committee Meeting on September 26, 2024.

ACTION: The Area Agency on Aging staff recommends that the HOTCOG Executive Committee approve FY25 contracts to be awarded to the Nutrition Subrecipients and Contractors for In-Home Care, Health Maintenance, and Residential Repair at the rates provided in each table above. Note: There is a possibility that the Subrecipients and the Contractors could receive more than \$50,000 from October 1, 2024, through September 30, 2025; if this occurs approval is also requested for expenditures of over \$50,000 for individual subrecipient and/or contractors from October 1, 2024 through September 30, 2025.

<u>9-1-1</u>

HOTCOG 9-1-1 IP Network (Next-Generation 9-1-1)

Members of the TriCOG 9-1-1 Alliance (BVCOG, CTCOG and HOTCOG) continue to collaborate with network consultants and equipment vendors to maintain a robust network. The TriCOG Alliance maintains its partnership with Mission Critical Partners (MCP) for NextGen Core Services (NGCS) Consulting and Cybersecurity Support. MCP follows a scope of work identifying three tasks to assist the TriCOG in technical issues to include Project/Task Management for GIS Readiness and Geospatial Call Routing, Procurement support for a Request for Proposal for call handling equipment and the development of a Cyber Security Plan. Members of the TriCOG participate in regularly scheduled conference calls to discuss ongoing NGCS projects and planning for the future of the regional networks. In addition, project planning calls with Motorola Solutions Connectivity, Inc. continue to be held weekly, and discussions include ongoing project deliverables and discussions for upcoming activities.

Enterprise Geospatial Database Management System (EGDMS)

In NG9-1-1 systems, an EGDMS (GIS map data) replaces the traditional Master Street Address Guide (MSAG) for location-based 9-1-1 call routing and location validation. An EGDMS is crucial for the transition to NG9-1-1 because it provides a means to create and maintain data critical to NG9-1-1 success. Staff participated in the Customer Focus Group (CFG) for this project. The CFG was responsible for assisting with development of the Quality Assurance/Quality Control plan, participating in GIS Data Management collaboration meetings, and assisting in GIS data management workflow development.

9-1-1 staff exceeded the 99% data match rate as recommended by the National Emergency Number Association (NENA) with a match rate of 99.99% with no critical errors remaining. HOTCOG has completed the transition to an EGDMS, and staff is a participant in a focus group for continued implementation across the state.

Text-to-9-1-1

Text-to-9-1-1 is available in the HOTCOG Region as an alternate means of communicating with 9-1-1 for people with a hearing and/or speech disability, or when speaking aloud would put the individual in danger. Text-to-9-1-1 also provides a silent alternative in cases such as child abduction, active shooter, or domestic abuse.

Criminal Justice

Planning Grant

Grant application workshops have been scheduled for October 2024 for the coming FY2025 application requests.

Lana began updating the 2025 Strategic plans for the region.

SART - the Heart of Texas Sexual Assault Response Team meetings will be divided into subcommittees by county to help increase participation by members. New protocols will be developed for each subcommittee to address the differences in responses.

New members for the CJAC will be added to the committee to meet the new requirements set forth by the Office of the Governor. Lana has contacted potential new members to discuss the requirements for the committee.

Regional Law Enforcement Training Academy Grant

Lana taught the Advanced Instructor for 6 individual officers 5, in region officers and one out of region officer.

Lana has scheduled two additional Advanced Instructor courses, both of which are full and have a waiting list. Lana continued working on the training schedule for FY 2025 and will be adding the Field Training Officer Course and the Investigative Interview Course to the calendar in FY2025.

BMMAP

CJ Planner, partnered with New Mexico Tech to bring two courses Understanding and Planning for School Bombing Incidents (UPSBI) and Surviving Bombing Incidents for Educators (SBIE). 65 individuals have registered for these classes.

217 students attended HOTCOG training, totaling 5968 contact training hours since November 2023.

Economic & Community Development Department Staff Report: September 2024

Revolving Loan Fund

USDA Fund:

- Purpose: Support local businesses for growth, job creation, and regional economic diversification.
- Target: Small and emerging businesses in rural areas of Bosque, Falls, Freestone, Hill, Limestone, and rural McLennan Counties.
- Criteria:
 - o Private businesses employing 50 or fewer new employees.
 - o Projected gross revenues of less than \$1 million.
 - Preference for businesses in specified rural counties, though exceptions may be made for businesses outside the region with a positive economic impact.
 - Ob creation or retention requirement: One full-time job per \$10,000 in loan funding.
 - o Ownership: 51% interest in the business must be by U.S. citizens or legal permanent residents.
 - o Financial necessity: Evidence required that project needs cannot be met by owner resources or commercial financial institutions.
- Available Funds: \$247,690.79

TDA Fund (SMRF):

- Purpose: Expand economic opportunities for low- and moderate-income persons.

The 2-1-1 program is a nationwide "free" social service phone help line answered by highly trained call specialists who listen to help-seeker's needs and provide resources and information to evaluate and make the choice as to which referral sources may best fit their needs. The help-seeker can then reach out to the resources that they choose. It is the help-seeker's responsibility to reach out to each agency and provide any additional information requested for consideration for assistance through their program. 2-1-1 does not provide any direct funding, only referrals to non-profit, social services agencies who have voluntarily become part of our database designed to assist our help-seekers. We always encourage all help-seekers to call back to 2-1-1 at any time should they need more resources or identify another need. 2-1-1 provides referral information about health and human services to all callers regardless of age, ethnicity, gender, disability, or any other criteria. 2-1-1 is available 365 days a year and 24 hours a day.

HTCG 2-1-1 continues to take traditional calls for local social service needs including food pantries, utility bills, rent, childcare, and medication assistance plus mental health and everything from A-Z for the state of Texas including the six-county service area. In addition, we take disaster related calls when such an event occurs and provide close monitoring and reporting of any resources available for those impacted by the disaster.

When help-seekers indicate that they need referrals for community assistance the call specialists try to identify at least 3 resources for each identified need. There is no limit to the time of each call, or the number of needs discussed. Most of the community resource phone calls can be characterized as needing help with two or more services, such as rent and electricity or prescription assistance and food pantries. Our goal is to provide as many resources as the help-seeker needs. We also make sure to ask help-seekers who ultimately need to be transferred to HHSC if there is anything else we can help them with prior to transferring them, and quite often they will ask for assistance in one or more areas.

Please help spread the word that 2-1-1 phone assistance is available 24/7 to everyone! All ages, all races, all socioeconomic backgrounds. We have resources from A-Z, and we are here to help. The website www.211texas.org is also available 24/7.

General Information:

HOTRTD Staff has applied to TXDOT and been informed that we will receive Transit Technical Service Program (TTSP) assistance. The Transit Technical Services Program (TTSP) provides focused technical assistance to rural public transit systems in five areas: financial management and analysis, capital project development, operational and service analysis, policy, procedure and program document development, and strategic planning, performance, and organizational development. The technical assistance provided is short-term in duration, lasting between two and six months. The application is for technical assistance with policy, procedure, and program document development. A kickoff meeting was held on August 29th with HOTCOG staff, KFH Group and TXDOT.

Funding

Staff has been notified that it will be receiving \$873,672.00 in federal funds and \$403,185 in rural state funds for FY2025. The federal funds increased by \$70,000 and our state funds decreased by \$26,000.00. The reduction in state rural funds leaves HOTRTD with a \$113,879.00 shortfall in funding for FY2025.




