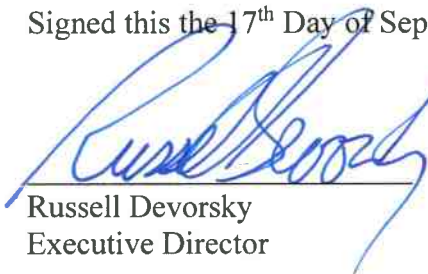

- I. Call to Order and Determination of a Quorum
President Jimmy Rogers called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m., Thursday, August 27, 2026.
- II. Proof of Posting of notice in accordance with Chapter 551, Texas Government Code, as amended, known as the Texas Open Meetings Act.

Proof of posting of the August 27, 2026 Executive Committee meeting was provided by Mary McDow.

- III. Introduction of Guests – Guests and staff were introduced.
- IV. Consideration of and/or action on the following:

- A. Approval of the July 23, 2026 meeting minutes

A motion was made by Judge Jay Elliott and seconded by Commissioner Jim Smith to approve the July 23, 2026 meeting minutes as presented. Motion passed.

- B. New Business

1. Authorization of Approval of 9-1-1 Expenditures
VESTA Router Service – Motorola Solutions Connectivity

Mrs. Kristine Hill stated the HOTCOG 911 staff is requesting authorization to approve expenditures of approximately \$167,470 for 12 months of recurring costs for the VESTA Router Service provided by Motorola Solutions Connectivity, Inc. This service has been deployed in the HOTCOG Region since September 2021, and currently routes all 9-1-1 traffic for the agencies serving HOTCOG.

A motion was made by Judge Jay Elliott and seconded by Commissioner Jim Smith that the Heart of Texas Council of Governments' Executive Committee approve the authorization for the Executive Director to sign service agreements with Motorola Solutions Connectivity, Inc. for Next Generation Core Services cost expenditures exceeding \$50,000 for the HOTCOG Regional 9-1-1 Program.

2. Approval of HOTCOG 2026-2027 Budget

Ms. Michelle Vasquez presented the HOTCOG 2026-2027 Budget to the Executive Committee for review and approval. Ms. Vasquez noted that HOTCOG has not yet received all official funding level notifications from state and federal agencies. The estimated revenues are based on a combination of official funding notices and estimated planning figures. Currently, a \$1,700

General Fund Net Surplus is being projected for the year. The proposed budget contains a 2.0% cost of living adjustment (COLA) increase for all employees.

A motion was made by Judge Jay Elliott and seconded by Judge Richard Duncan to approve the FY2026-2027 Budget document and recommend approval and adoption of the FY2026-27 Budget to the Council Representatives at their meeting. Motion passed.

C. Report of the Executive Director and Staff

1. Department of Administration

a. Financial and Personnel Reports

Ms. Vasquez presented the financial and personnel reports to the committee.

2. Regional Services

Department Activities Report

Mrs. Jackson presented the activities report for Regional Services. It was noted that under the Public Works Grant, the EDA Austin Regional Office has recommended the City of Hillsboro for a \$5 million Public Works award and staff is waiting for approval from Washington, D.C. Mrs. Jackson stated that staff continue to work on the Broadband program grant. Staff launched the HOTCOG regional Broadband Survey to gather community input that will support broadband access and digital opportunity planning.

3. Health & Human Services

Mr. John Vorderkunz presented the activities report for the Health and Human Services division. It was noted that issues continue with the new State-mandated data management software.

Mr. Rep Pledger noted that staff had been notified that the Transportation program would receive \$929,063.00 in federal funds and \$411,523 in rural state funds for FY2027. Staff continues their outreach to clients to increase ridership.

4. Executive Director's Report

Mr. Devorsky noted that the National Association of Development Organizations (NADO) will meet in October for their Annual Training Conference. Mr. Devorsky currently serves as the Secretary-Treasurer on the Executive Board and is slated to move up to 2nd Vice-President. Mr. Devorsky stated the speaker for the Council Representatives meeting at noon will be Mr. John Versluis, Executive Director of the Texas Heritage Museum at Hill College. President Rogers will present Mr. Versluis with a gift presentation of the Battle Flag from the 143rd Infantry that was carried in Europe in World War I and II. Also at the meeting staff members Marcy Whiddon will be recognized for 5 years of service and Dorthy Jackson will be recognized for 10 years of service.

REGIONAL SERVICES REPORT

9-1-1

HOTCOG 9-1-1 IP Network (Next-Generation 9-1-1)

Members of the TriCOG 9-1-1 Alliance (BVCOG, CTCOG and HOTCOG) continue to collaborate with network consultants and equipment vendors to maintain a robust network. The TriCOG Alliance maintains its partnership with Mission Critical Partners (MCP) for NextGen Core Services (NGCS) Consulting and Cybersecurity Support. MCP follows a scope of work identifying tasks to assist the TriCOG with technical issues to include Project/Task Management and support. Members of the TriCOG participate in regularly scheduled conference calls to discuss ongoing NGCS projects and planning for the future of the regional networks. In addition, project planning calls with Motorola Solutions Connectivity, Inc. are held weekly, and discussions include ongoing project deliverables and discussions for upcoming activities.

Enterprise Geospatial Database Management System (EGDMS)

In NG9-1-1 systems, an EGDMS (GIS map data) replaces the traditional Master Street Address Guide (MSAG) for location-based 9-1-1 call routing and location validation. An EGDMS is crucial for the transition to NG9-1-1 because it provides a means to create and maintain data critical to NG9-1-1 success. Staff participated in the Customer Focus Group (CFG) for this project. The CFG was responsible for assisting with the development of the Quality Assurance/Quality Control plan, participating in GIS Data Management collaboration meetings, and assisting in GIS data management workflow development. 9-1-1 staff exceeded the 99% data match rate as recommended by the National Emergency Number Association (NENA) with a match rate of 99.99% with no critical errors remaining. HOTCOG has completed the transition to an EGDMS, and staff participants on a focus group for continued implementation across the state.

Text-to-9-1-1

Text-to-9-1-1 is available in the HOTCOG Region as an alternate means of communicating with 9-1-1 for people with a hearing and/or speech disability, or when speaking aloud would put the individual in danger. Text-to-9-1-1 also provides a silent alternative in cases such as child abduction, active shooter, or domestic abuse.

Public Education

There were 3,764 public education items distributed to the Region for public education and public outreach events.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE

Planning Grant

Lana continues work on planning for the 2026 Strategic planning meetings to update all the community plans for the region. Lana added several new members to the community planning committees to get more information regarding the gaps in services in our region. This year the Regional Strategic plans will be completely overhauled to add new services available as well as identifying additional priorities for the region.

Lana continues to work on the new Mental Health Resource Guidebook, this guide will be distributed to the regional Law Enforcement agencies.

Regional Law Enforcement Training Academy Grant

Lana attended the annual TCOLE training conference in Waco this year. This conference is mandatory for all training coordinators. During the conference Lana met with the TCOLE curriculum development team regarding the Advanced Instructor Training course. The curriculum for this course is very outdated. The team has begun the process of updating the curriculum. Lana will be working with TCOLE on the development of the new curriculum. The goal of the team is to release the new curriculum by December, 2026.

Juvenile Justice Alternative

Lana completed the reimbursement agreements for FY 2027 and mailed them to all six county judges for approval.

Crisis Intervention

The LOSS Team presentation on Suicide Prevention - Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST) registration has been closed because the class is full, requests for this class continue to be received. Lana will be working with the LOSS Team to offer this class again in 2027. ASIST is a two-day interactive workshop in suicide first-aid. ASIST teaches participants to recognize when someone may have thoughts of suicide and works with them to create a plan that will support their immediate safety. Although ASIST is widely used by healthcare providers, participants don't need any formal training to attend the workshop—ASIST can be learned and used by anyone.

239 students attended HOTCOG training, totaling 5276 contact training hours since September 2025.

Economic & Community Development Department Staff Report

Revolving Loan Fund

USDA Fund:

- Purpose: Support local businesses for growth, job creation, and regional economic diversification.
- Target: Small and emerging businesses in rural areas of Bosque, Falls, Freestone, Hill, Limestone, and rural McLennan Counties.
- Criteria:
 - Private businesses employing 50 or fewer new employees.
 - Projected gross revenues of less than \$1 million.
 - Preference for businesses in specified rural counties, though exceptions may be made for businesses outside the region with a positive economic impact.
 - Job creation or retention requirement: One full-time job per \$10,000 in loan funding.
 - Ownership: 51% interest in the business must be by U.S. citizens or legal permanent residents.
 - Financial necessity: Evidence required that project needs cannot be met by owner resources or commercial financial institutions.
- Available Funds: **\$247,691.00**

TDA Fund (SMRF):

- Purpose: Expand economic opportunities for low- and moderate-income persons.
- Target: Small and microenterprise businesses in Falls County.
- Criteria:
 - Microenterprises: Commercial enterprises with five or fewer employees, one or more of whom owns the enterprise.

- Small Enterprises: Commercial enterprises with 25 or fewer employees, one or more of whom owns the enterprise.
- Available Funds: **\$72,000.00 estimated**

U.S. Economic Development:

Key Economic Development Investments Supported by EDA

The Economic Development Administration (EDA) continues to play a crucial role in fostering economic growth, job creation, and infrastructure development. The following priority investment areas illustrate EDA's commitment to supporting communities through strategic economic initiatives:

Infrastructure and Facility Development

- **Technology-Based Facilities** – Supporting innovation and research hubs to drive economic advancement.
- **Multi-Tenant Manufacturing Facilities** – Enabling flexible manufacturing spaces that enhance industrial productivity.
- **Business and Industrial Parks** – Facilitating the development of business clusters and regional economic hubs.
- **Telecommunication and Development Facilities** – Expanding broadband and communication infrastructure to strengthen connectivity.
- **Water and Sewer System Improvements** – Enhancing critical infrastructure to support sustainable economic growth.

Business and Workforce Development

- **Business Incubator Facilities** – Providing early-stage businesses with essential resources and support.
- **Port and Harbor Expansions** – Strengthening trade and logistics infrastructure to enhance regional commerce.
- **Skill-Training Facilities** – Investing in workforce training programs to meet evolving industry demands.
- **Brownfield Redevelopment** – Restoring and repurposing underutilized or contaminated sites for economic use.

These investments reflect EDA's focus on fostering resilient, innovation-driven, and inclusive economic development across regions. By strategically aligning resources with community needs, EDA continues to enhance economic opportunities and regional competitiveness.

Priorities:

EDA's investment priorities provide an overarching framework to ensure its grant investment portfolio – ranging from planning to infrastructure construction -- contributes to local efforts to build, improve, or better leverage economic assets that allow businesses to succeed and regional economies to prosper and become more resilient. Competitive grant applications will be responsive to the evaluation criteria listed under each individual funding announcement, including at least one of the below investment priorities.

1. **Critical Infrastructure:** Economic development planning or implementation projects that support development of public facilities, including basic public infrastructure, transportation infrastructure, or telecommunications infrastructure.
2. **Workforce:** Economic Development planning or implementation projects that –
 - a. Support job skills training to meet the hiring needs of the area in which the project is to be carried out and that result in well-paying jobs; or
 - b. Otherwise promote labor force participation.
3. **Innovation and Entrepreneurship:** Economic development planning or implementation projects that –
 - a. Support the development of innovation and entrepreneurship-related infrastructure;
 - b. Promote business development and lending; or
 - c. Foster the commercialization of new technologies that are creating technology-driven businesses and high-skilled, well-paying jobs of the future.
4. **Economic Recovery Resilience:** Economic development planning or implementation projects that enhance the ability of an area to withstand and recover from adverse short-term or long-term changes in economic conditions, including effects from industry contractions or economic impacts from natural disasters.
5. **Manufacturing:** Economic development planning or implementation projects that encourage job creation, business expansion, technology and capital upgrades, and productivity growth in manufacturing, including efforts that contribute to the competitiveness and growth of domestic suppliers or the domestic production of innovative, high-value products and production technologies.

U.S. Economic Development Administration Grants

EDA AI Upskill Accelerator Pilot Program

The U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) has released a new Artificial Intelligence (AI) Upskill Accelerator Pilot Program under its FY 2023–2025 Public Works and Economic Adjustment Assistance (PWEAA) Notice of Funding Opportunity. The initiative will invest approximately \$25 million nationwide to support industry-led workforce development partnerships focused on preparing workers for AI-enabled industries and occupations.

EDA anticipates making **5–8 awards** ranging from approximately **\$1 million to \$8 million**, with project periods of 24–36 months. Projects must begin workforce training implementation within one year of award. **A 40% local match is generally required.**

The program is designed to help regions respond to rapid changes in workforce skill requirements driven by artificial intelligence adoption. Eligible projects must establish sector-based partnerships involving employers, training providers, workforce organizations, educational institutions, and other regional stakeholders. These partnerships are expected to develop and implement training programs that equip workers with practical, job-ready AI skills beyond introductory AI literacy.

EDA identified several priority industries where AI adoption is rapidly transforming operations and workforce needs, including manufacturing, aerospace, biopharmaceuticals, logistics, energy production, and data centers.

Projects may include up to three phases:

- **System Development** – building and organizing sector partnerships;
- **Program Design** – developing curriculum, training models, and employer-aligned credential pathways; and
- **Program Implementation** – delivering workforce training and participant support services. Program implementation is required for all projects.

Eligible applicants include Economic Development Districts, local governments, higher education institutions, nonprofit organizations, and public-private partnerships.

Applications will be submitted through EDA’s EDGE portal, with a current application deadline of July 10, 2026.

The AI Upskill initiative aligns closely with EDA’s workforce, innovation, and economic competitiveness priorities and may present future opportunities for regional collaboration involving workforce boards, community colleges, employers, and economic development organizations within the HOTCOG region.

Economic Development Administration (EDA) FY 2025 Disaster Supplemental Grant Program

(Excluding McLennan County Communities)

Current Update: Disaster Supplemental funding is still being allocated.

The U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) has announced the **FY 2025 Disaster Supplemental Grant Program**, providing **\$1.45 billion** in recovery funding. This program is designed to help communities affected by federally declared disasters in **2023 and 2024** not only rebuild but also strengthen long-term resilience and economic outcomes.

Funding Pathways

1. Readiness Path

- **Purpose:** Build capacity for future projects (non-construction).
- **Eligible Activities:** Recovery strategies, disaster coordinators, capacity-building, pre-development planning.
- **Grant Range:** \$250,000 – \$500,000

2. Implementation Path

Location Requirements

Matching Fund Requirements

- **Standard:** EDA funds up to **80% of project costs**.

- **Exceptions:**
 - Up to 100% for Tribal applicants or severely distressed areas.
 - Coalition projects may distribute match requirements across components.

- **Readiness & Implementation Grants:** Accepted on a rolling basis until funds are exhausted or the NOFO is closed.
- **Industry Transformation Grants:** Due **March 3, 2026, by 5:00 PM (ET)**.

Recommendations for HOTCOG Region Counties (Excluding McLennan)

1. **Review FEMA Disaster Declaration Eligibility** to confirm county/community qualification.
2. **Assess Project Readiness** – determine if counties/communities are best suited for Readiness, Implementation, or Industry Transformation pathways.
3. **Engage Local Stakeholders** – involve businesses, higher education, and nonprofits to align projects with regional economic needs.
4. **Consider Coalition Applications** – maximize funding potential under Industry Transformation by building multi-county or regional proposals.
5. **Leverage HOTEDD Role** – coordinate county applications under the regional Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS).

Conclusion

This funding opportunity represents a significant chance for HOTCOG counties and communities (outside McLennan) to access federal resources that not only address disaster recovery but also foster **long-term resilience, economic transformation, and regional growth**.

FY 2023 PWEAA Application Submission and Program Requirements:

The FY 2023 Public Works and Economic Adjustment Assistance (PWEAA) Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) outlines the process for applying to two core EDA programs under the Public Works and Economic Development Act: the Public Works program and the Economic Adjustment Assistance (EAA) program. This NOFO replaces the FY 2020 version and includes updated application requirements.

Key Points:

- **Funding Availability:** Applications are accepted on a rolling basis until a new NOFO is issued, the current NOFO is canceled, or all available funds are allocated. A recent update adds \$5M specifically for indigenous communities and incorporates regulatory changes (2 CFR 200 updates) for new FY25 awards.

- **Program Focus:** EDA emphasizes strategies that leverage regional strengths to foster economic growth, support equity, address workforce needs, and improve climate change resilience.
- **Review Process:** The EDA reviews applications promptly upon receiving complete submissions.

EDA Planning Grant:

- **Awarded:** Three-year planning grant (2024-2026) at \$210,000 (\$70,000 per year).

Community Development

Broadband Program:

HOTCOG has been awarded funding through the Texas Regional Broadband Program (TRBP), funded by the Texas Broadband Development Office (BDO) and administered by TARC. HOTCOG will receive \$107,000 per year for three (3) years to support broadband and digital opportunity planning efforts within the region.

This three-year initiative is designed to strengthen broadband access and digital opportunity planning across participating COG regions. The program supports stakeholder engagement and the development of Regional Digital Opportunity Plans aligned with statewide goals. TARC will coordinate the statewide effort, BDO will provide funding and guidance, and COGs will lead local engagement and implementation activities.

HOTCOG will utilize existing staff to administer and manage this grant.

Outreach to community stakeholders and regional partners will be ongoing throughout the duration of the project. Staff has received approximately eleven recommendations for membership on the Regional Broadband Committee, thanks to the efforts of the HOTCOG Executive Committee and the HOTEDD Board. Staff is currently reviewing these recommendations as part of the committee formation process to guide regional planning and implementation efforts. In addition, staff is working to vet potential vendors to support the project. At this time, the availability of funds for vendor services remains uncertain due to the federal government shutdown and the lack of allocated funding for the Department of Homeland Security.

Health and Human Services Division

The following is a summary of the activities for the programs in the Health and Human Services Division of the Heart of Texas Council of Governments.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES PROGRAM DESCRIPTION AND ACTIVITY

John Vorderkunz – Director

The Health and Human Services Division (HHS) is one of two divisions of the Heart of Texas Council of Governments. The HHS division is made up of four different and distinct program areas 1) Area Agency on Aging; 2) Aging and Disability Resource Center; 3) Heart 2-1-1; and 4) Rural Transit District which primarily serves and works with individuals and family members who need assistance through either information or services. Below are the four program descriptions and activities.

The issues with our new State-mandated data management software persist and we are no longer even getting updated projections as to when it will be fully operational. The most recent update occurred at the Texas Association of Regional Councils (TARC) semi-annual training conference on 9/15/26. The leadership for the Area Agencies on Aging (the OAAA) stated that while our reporting issues are on the priority list, they are at the bottom of that list. We will provide a comprehensive report covering the delayed data as soon as we are able.

REACH-TX (Resources for Enhancing Alzheimer's Caregiver Health) assists caregivers manage their health and well-being. REACH-TX is for family and friend caregivers of persons living with Alzheimer's Disease and related dementia. With the assistance of a trained and certified Dementia Care Specialist and Caregiver's Notebook this program is known to decrease the caregiver's depression; decrease the caregiver's burden, improve the level of social support, and improve the capability to take care of the caregiver's health and well-being.

2. Heart of Texas Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC)

The 2-1-1 program is a nationwide “free” social service phone helpline answered by highly trained contact specialists who listen to caller’s needs and provide resources and information to assist in meeting their needs. The contact specialists attempt to identify at least 3 resources for each identified need. It is the caller’s responsibility to reach out to each agency and provide any additional information requested for consideration for assistance through their program. We always encourage all callers to call us again should they need more resources or identify another need.

Marcy Whiddon has returned to her previous role as our Heart of Texas 2-1-1 Database Resource Manager and Emergency Management Coordinator. Marcy has six years experience in resource management along with working closely with all of our emergency management contacts and is a huge asset to our 2-1-1 Program.

Our 2-1-1 Team is fully functional and taking calls and answering web-based communications via CHAT making a difference in lives every day. We consistently have a good number of new callers each month. We expect great things for FY27. We continue to provide Outreach to all counties in our region and work hard to educate the public about 2-1-1 and all we can do to help and support them.

2-1-1 provides referral information about health and human services to all callers regardless of age, ethnicity, gender, disability, or other criteria. 2-1-1 is available 365 days a year and 24 hours a day. 2-1-1 does not provide any funding, only resources to callers for non-profit, social service agencies who have voluntarily become part of our database designed to assist our callers. HOT 2-1-1 continues to take traditional calls for local social service needs, including food pantries, utility bills, rent, childcare, medication assistance, mental health, and everything from A to Z for the state of Texas, including our six-county service area. In addition, we provide assistance for disaster-related calls when such an event occurs and provide close monitoring and reporting of any resources available for those impacted by the disaster. Disaster support is provided across the state of Texas.

Our goal is to assist with as many resources as the caller needs. We also make sure to ask callers who ultimately need to be transferred to the Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) for state benefit assistance if there is anything else we can assist them with before transferring them, and quite often they will ask for assistance in one or more areas.

Please help spread the word that 2-1-1 phone assistance is available 24/7 to everyone! All ages, all races, all socioeconomic backgrounds. We have resources from A-Z, and we are here to help. The website www.211texas.org is also available 24/7.

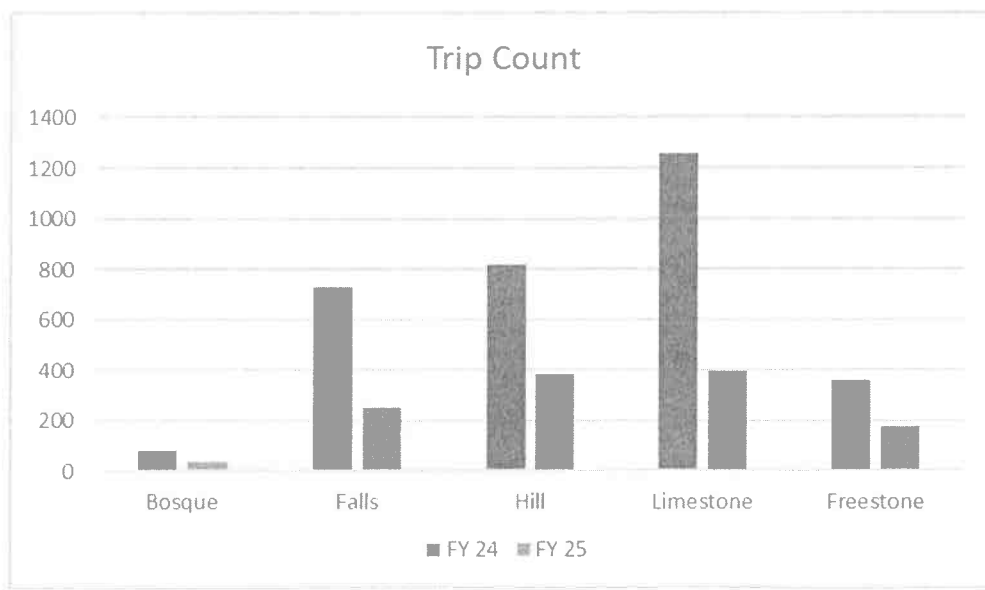
